

There is much to celebrate and look forward to at All Saints: the feast of Corpus Christi on Sunday 2nd June, commemorating the institution of the Eucharist, the joint pilgrimage to Glastonbury on Saturday 13th July, where the preacher will be Rowan Williams, now Baron Williams of Oystermouth, and on September 10th and 12th we hold our Heritage Open Days. The life of the church is growing, as is clear each Sunday and in our Wednesday coffee church mornings at St Saviour's, where numbers are consistently breaking records.

We're very grateful to everyone who supports this; to Father Christopher who plays for us, and to all who work behind the scenes providing the much appreciated refreshments and helping to clear away afterwards.

So, let us look forward with confidence to a joyful future. We keep in our prayers all those who would like to join us each Sunday but are unable to do so. You are in our thoughts and in our hearts, as are those who have recently suffered a bereavement. May our prayers comfort and uphold you.

Father Brendan writes: Dear friends at All Saints and St Saviour's,

We have had such good news over the past few months which I reported on at the APCM and I want to share this with you, the wider All Saints Community.

First you will know that our tired old and inefficient boilers need replacing. This is, to use a favourite phrase of mine, 'mission critical.' No-one wants to worship, pray or listen to music in a cold church. Now the cost is prohibitive, around £46k plus VAT in an estimate months ago.

I am delighted to let you know that three grant making bodies have agreed to fund us up to the tune of £23,500, which, if we put into an application to Heritage Lottery will be the match funding their processes require.

Now there's an important aspect to these grants. Whilst one of them is local and one of the trustees is Julia Elton of Clevedon Court, the other two, the Ascot Priory Trust and the Number One Trust are Anglo-Catholic is origin. What this tells me is that what we are trying to do in the regeneration of our parish with its distinctive traditions is being

recognised by the wider church. We should draw much confidence from this. It bodes well for the future.

Secondly, though this is older news, the Additional Curates Society last year awarded us a grant of £30k over three years to support the costs of ministry at All Saints. This is another sign of support and encouragement from the wider church which will, God and you willing, help us pay our parish share this year. And that is hugely significant in the eyes of the Diocese. Not least because it speaks about our confidence in our place in the life of the Diocese and in Weston-Super-Mare.

And finally, and I believe it is now common knowledge, we have been approached by the Diocese to become a training parish for a newly ordained deacon from June 2025. This person will be ordained to the priesthood in June 2026 and I have guaranteed (unless I am taken) to be his mentor for three years up until 2028, when I reach 70 years of age. This gives us security of tenure, and it means we can grow from the foundations now established. Whoever comes will work across both parishes with me BUT I hope he will be housed in Weston, and, because the training and housing of the newly ordained comes from a separate and distinct Diocesan budget and National church funding, there is no reason why this may not be the case.

What I say to you, dear people, is that we can optimistically look to the future in hope. We have so much to offer the town and our church. Word will get out. People will return. New people will join. This is my fervent prayer. Please help me make it a reality!


